kcarter@agapeofnc.org 919-673-7816 I don't know about you, but I'm a self-proclaimed box-checker, a planner. I like to know what's coming, when it's coming, and how long it's going to last. Enter foster care . . . where absolutely none of those things are prevalent.

Due to the unpredictable nature of foster care, I find it extremely beneficial to fill my toolbox with tools way ahead of the game instead of waiting until I'm treading water, trying to keep myself and everybody else in the house afloat.

Staff at AGAPE of NC all recently went through a Duke Endowment Training program called, "Together Facing the Challenge," a toolbox for trauma informed care. We're now going to require all of AGAPE's foster parents to go through this training as well. It's our prayer that these tools will not just keep you afloat, but allow your families to thrive.

We don't know what we don't know. Thus, shedding some light, talking together, sharing, and equipping each other to help these children -- even if it's just being reminded that you are not alone in this struggle -- is an encouragement at the very least.

I know what you're thinking. "One more training." "One more thing to add to the calendar." Believe me, I get it. Besides my work with AGAPE



families, my husband and I have been foster parents, ourselves, for six years. (We have been taking a little break this summer, after our last placement moved on May 4th, leaving our cup empty for this brief time.)

I understand how, when you're in the thick of it, it's hard not to take it personally.

It's hard not to see certain behavior as anything but defiance. However, the more we understand about trauma -- and its effects on the body and brain -- we can begin to see the behavior as a language and begin to help these children heal.

AGAPE Staff are all excited to walk through this training "together" with you because your stories are not my stories; your experiences will be different from others in the group.

Yet, it's in our community that we'll find strength and the ability to face the challenge of loving children from hard places.



Jessica Patton and her husband, Jake, are both educators in Raleigh who saw first-hand the immense need for foster and adoptive parents in their very own community.

"The fact is there are kids out there who need forever homes - and we can provide that."

When the couple first began their journey into foster care and adoption, they didn't jump in quickly. "We talked to a lot of families who had adopted before or

who had fostered. We researched - for almost a year - our different options to find the right fit for us." To them, foster care seemed ideal since they strongly believed that family reunification should be the main goal.

Once they knew what their path would be, someone at their church highly recommended reaching out to AGAPE of NC. Due to the self-paced nature of AGAPE's training and how individualized the process was, they knew right away they were in the right place. "It helped us to feel supported and as prepared as possible to enter foster parenthood."

Looking back to the beginning of their journey, Jessica shared that before they began fostering she had some concerns about

fostering an older child.

"We had the misled belief that it would be more difficult to bond with an older child and that there would be more challenges." As she now knows, the challenges are not more difficult but just different.

"There are so many great things about bonding with a child who can communicate with you!"

Making the choice to welcome an older child into their home was what led them to Joseline.

After over a year in their home, Jessica and Jake are thrilled to share they added another "J" to the family! Joseline, age 8, was officially adopted by June 2021. While adopting during a



pandemic was a memorable experience, they are overjoyed that the result was becoming this kind, curious, and outgoing girl's parents. They also acknowledge that their gain was a loss for Joseline and her birth family.

"Adoption can be such a dichotomy. It is filled with both joy and sorrow, beauty and brokenness, gain and loss. It has been a very emotional journey."

When pressed for advice for others considering fostering, Jessica's main suggestion is to stay open to all possibilities. "Having an open heart and mind can change everything. You never know what God has in store for you." Preparation is also key. She recommends educating yourself on transracial parenting and hair care before a child enters your home, building your trauma-informed tool-kit, and always remembering to view children's behaviors with a trauma-informed lens. But, she concedes, "You are never truly ready for parenthood. Learn to be present for this moment and the joys it brings and focus a little less on what lies ahead."

The other piece of advice she stresses is to lean on your community. "Our AGAPE of NC social worker, Kia Carter, has been the most amazing support





system! We were able to build our relationship with her as we went through training, and she really got to know us and our strengths and needs. She has helped guide us through every step of the process and is always available when we have questions or don't understand something."

When Jessica and Jake met Joseline, Joseline shared something that always stuck with them. "She said once she was adopted, she wanted to have a pool party." So, last month Jessica and Jake did just that and threw Joseline an adoption party where they were surrounded by all the people who had been on this journey with them. "My favorite part of fostering? Being able to love on our girl and to provide the safety and support that she needs."

## **BACKPACK BLESSINGS!**

In June, Volunteer Backpack Coordinator, Tatum Fitzgerald, informed AGAPE that: "We stuffed Tween/Teen backpacks today and delivered them to Mt. Vernon Middle School! We also stuffed some of AGAPE's yellow bags with toothpaste, toothbrushes, hairbrushes, loofahs, shampoos, lotions, and deodorants for Raleigh Church of Christ's ministry at a Women's Shelter. We packed a little over 60 bags! Here's a picture of the kiddos who volunteered!" Some toothbrushes & toothpaste were also given to Raleigh Church of Christ's food pantry, as well!

Last May, AGAPE delivered 45 "First Night" bags to InterAct and they were grateful for the assist. They wrote, "InterAct's mission for over 40 years has been

dedicated to ending the cycle of domestic and sexual violence in Wake County. Often when survivors and their children are fleeing violence, they arrive with just the clothes on their backs. Many times, they have truly left everything behind. InterAct is so grateful to AGAPE of NC for the donation of 'First Night' backpacks which will provide some much-needed comfort on a child's first night in our shelter and in the days that follow."



Then in August, AGAPE was again blessed to be able to contribute the remaining backpack donations:

School supplies to Mt. Vernon Middle School;

 Blankets, hair care products & toiletries to Raleigh Church of Christ for their Women's Shelter ministry; and

Stuffed animals & small blankets to Isabelle's Stuffed
Animal Drive, a collection & delivery service
begun by Isabelle Murphy five years ago. This

year Isabelle expanded her service to include other volunteers from **Franklin** 

Academy for their Senior Service
Project. The objective is to provide comfort items to kids in foster care and also to first responders (e.g. police officers, firefighters, EMT's, shelters & safe houses, etc.) to give to youngsters who've experienced traumatic events.
